- **It is a multi faculty college having nineteen programs. The programs are running under a planned process, which monitored by the different committees formed by the Principal.**
- **Faculty members take their utmost care to complete the syllabi within time and always strive for effective curriculum delivery. Term tests are conducted in accordance with the schedule. Extra classes are also being conducted. The Principal takes feedback from the students, faculty members, alumni groups as well as parents to assess the progress of the institution. The students are facilitated with extension lectures also. Students are also encouraged for field survey and projects. The institution is well equipped with smart classrooms.**
- **Institution is making extra efforts for empowerment of women. College also has a Sanitary Napkin Machine for them. Scooties are also distributed to girls of special backward classe under the Dev Narayan Scheme of government.**
- **We teach various crosscutting issues - Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values etc. with the curriculum. A compulsory paper 'Environmental Studies' is being taught to the students of all streams. Plantation is also encouraged by NCC / NSS / Rover units of the college. Our initiative 'No Vehicle Day' is appreciated by the state government.**

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Govt. Lohia P.G. College, Churu has 8044 students studying across 18 departments. The college offers 87 programmes from UG to Ph.D. levels in arts, science and commerce. The admission is highly competitive and based on merit and reservation norms. Being one of the top ten colleges of Rajasthan, the college hosted average 100% students from shekhawati area. For every available seat, the college received around three times more application. The

average percentage of seats filled against reserved categories during the report period is more than 100% because some students stands in general category as their percentage marks are more better than general category students. From few years back students get admission from EWS category .

The college had 57 well qualified faculty during 2021-22 and the student faculty ratio for the year was 141: 1. All the classrooms, seminar hall , conference hall, e-classroom, laboratories are well maintained. Nearly 56 % of the faculty holds Ph.D. degrees,29.8% members are with NET/JRF/SLET.

The institute adopts measures to support both advanced and slow learners, such as orientation programme, seminars, interaction with eminent personalities and remedial classes, e-classes and competitive coaching classes. Special summer camps were also conducted in three courses (Spoken english, photography and birds identification) without any fee from students.

The examination management system is well maintained. During the report period assessment is incorporated into the learning process to achieve the learning goals of the courses. Continuous internal evaluation is done periodically and transparency and fairness of evaluation system are ensured through committee. The college has an effective mechanism for redressal of grievances. Examination results display exemplary performance of the students who largely occupy the top merit position in the M.G.S. University, Bikaner on honour board and in P.G. departments. Our alumni members represent benchmark and doing outstanding work both nationally and internationally.

Govt lohia College Churu have god Environmental, Green and well equipped campus spread over acres area in the main heart of churu town located time location opposite of railway station and nearby the bus stand which makes it differ from all the government colleges of Rajasthan. The Government lohia college Established on 08 sep. 1943 inaugurated by The Prince of Bikaner Riyasat Shree Sadul Singh Ji. The main contributor is Seth Kanhaiy lal Lohia to makes this college for Welfare of the society. College has adequate infrastructural facilities as catalyst for ensuring academic excellence. The main building harbors the Administrative, Academic and Establishment Sections, Chambers of Principal and Vice-Principal, Department of social science and Humanities, Departments of Science, Departments of Commerce, and Library. Separates seminar hall, Girls conman room, Incubation center, IGNOU and VMOU Kota study center. There are 41 classrooms, 01 Smart Classroom, 18 Practical Laboratories, 08 ICT enabled room with interactive Boards. ICT laboratory is equipped with 23 computers, LAN connection and

LCD projector along with a white screen. The College central library has about 101339 books classified and indexed. There is one Hall and an open Arena for cultural activities. This community Book bank was established in college campus. This is a positive intervention for society development. The college is constantly extending and expanding its IT resources in terms of computers, Management Information Systems, Learning Management Systems, operating systems, and servers etc. The video conferencing room in the college is used for virtual meetings with the Commissionerate College Education and District Administration. Audio-Video tools, LCD projector in various departments, Smart boards in different departments, Computers with LAN connections in every department, E-mitra plus machine, E-podium for recording e-lectures, Personal laptops, Wi fi, (bandwidth with more than 50 MBPS/GBPS , Digital visualiser etc. are some of the learning management systems used by the college. Monthly salary bills of all employees through Pay manager Portal E tendering module helps in procurement of goods and items and placing orders. Various Govt and citizen apps and modules on SSO give access to the facility of property return, provident fund, profile of employees and also applying for leave.

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

Learning and teaching at the college has always been student centric. The students participate in various academic and co-curricular activities within and outside the college. Visit to other institutes, field and educational trips, seminars and talks by experts are organized during the year. Students are given individual projects and class assignments, focusing on self study and independent learning. They are assigned project work which promote peer learning and team building.

Following measures are in operation to enhance the learning experience of the students.

- Periodic industrial visit/field work/rural camps.
- Periodic endowment lectures, conferences, orientation, workshops, seminars, exhibitions etc.
- Coaching classes for competitive exam for banking sector, school teachers, general knowledge, etc.
- ICT facility and various departmental libraries maximize the research potential of the students.
- NSS, NCC, Scouts, Human right club inculcate leadership and life skills among students.
- Apart from museums and natural lab, the biodiversity of the surrounding forest facilitates participative learning of the students.
- The departments of Zoology, Botany and Geography manage the good laboratory and conduct field study tours for M.Sc. students to study biodiversity.
- The women cell has been involved in orienting, sensitizing and empowering young minds towards gender issues and equity.
- Regular sports activities for all students to generate health and fitness consciousness among students.
- Central library and departmental libraries has a complete set of magazines, reports, journals and reference books.
- Information and Communications Technology (ICT) enabled teaching methodologies and advanced technology is being used by the faculty members in class rooms. Among all faculty members, maximum teachers are using ICT tools and resources available on its campuses.
- The academic plan and schedule for each class is forwarded by commissioner office to all college in which month wise syllabus is mentioned which is completed by faculty members.
- The use of multimedia teaching aids like, LCD projectors, classrooms with internet enabled computer/laptops/tablet systems /visualizes and smart teaching board are usually used in classroom.
- The faculty members effectively utilize Audio Visual aids to demonstrate the concepts to the students using the resources from preloaded videos of various universities and colleges. Online tests are conducted and e-assignments are given through whatsapp group or by Performa developed on Google service.
- The research journals are available online and facility for accessing these journals is provided through lease line in the campus. All P.G. departments conduct seminars, workshops and guest lectures on the new developments in the core subjects for effective teaching and learning by the faculty members and students every year.
- A separate smart class room and seminar hall are established at lohia college, Churu where resources by Leased line, Multimedia Projectors, Public address system, Document camera, Computers, Mooc's Desktops, Laptop, Wi-Fi ,LAN connected system are also used by the faculty.
- All PG departments are equipped with suitable ICT based facility. Faculty members developed e-

learning content, video, PPT videos. More than 2500 videos uploaded on YouTube channel. Guest lectures and technical talk are also arranged.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- The college ensures that all students are aware of the evaluation process through the college prospectus and guidelines issued by C.C.E., Jaipur which is uploaded annually during admission.
- In each streams at U.G. and P.G. level Deans were nominated for arts, science and commerce subjects. They coordinate curriculum transaction with other faculty members teaching the subject during the whole session.
- Before the session begins, teaching plans are prepared and discussed along with the mode of continuous internal evaluation.
- From time to time staff council meetings are organized which is compulsory to attend to all faculty members.
- Dates for the test of assignments are notified on the notice board and announced by faculty in the respective classes at least a week in advance. After checking answer sheets are shared with students and marking pattern is discussed. Students are asked for satisfaction of their writing pattern.
- Student's development in their subject's areas and other co-scholastic activities is monitored through continuous assessment which includes presentation during seminars, tests, project report by students who are guided by teachers.

- During examination internal flying squad monitor each students, thoroughly check-up them before entry into examination room. Invigilators also monitor the students to prevent them from copying.
- No any electronic devices are permissible to students. If any student is found using unfair means,

the case is filed against the students and sometimes FIR is also lodged in police station.

- This copy is dispatched to university for further evaluation. If the copying case is genuine than student is debarred for one year for appearing in next examinations. This incident is published in daily news paper so other students aware about this.
- From session 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022 the UM cases were 8, 12, 8 , 3, 3, 4 respectively .
- Students need to apply to the University for Correction in marks and re-evaluation. The process is governed by M.G.S. University, Bikaner. For errors like the mark sheets indicating that the student was absent, the college promptly sends the dully certified attendance sheet to assist in locating marks in exam branch and correcting discrepancies.
- Examination cell and the dealing assistant handle all grievances related to all issues. The cell promptly deals with mistakes/errors related to attendance, practical marks of the students as principal copy is kept in the college which may opened after declaration of result.
- For this overall process students write an application which is forwarded by principal of the college and dispatched to university where the correct copy is issued to students on the same day. For regular students all correspondence is promptly handled by college office.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

Performance appraisals are conducted annually to evaluate the commitment, behavior, and overall

performance of each employee. Faculty achievements are monitored through the Performance-Based Appraisal System (PBAS) in line with UGC guidelines, aiding promotion decisions. The appraisal results are communicated to employees, promoting a culture of continuous improvement and accountability.

The college implements all the welfare schemes of the State Government and tries to facilitate the same through various effective welfare measures. GPF/NPS and SI are compulsory deductions for future security. In addition, annual 'Group Insurance' is also deducted. Medical claims are reimbursed by the State Government as part of the health expense incurred by the employee. Additionally, RGHS (Rajasthan Govt Health Scheme) has been introduced since May 2021 covering IPD as well as OPD facilities to all the employees through their contribution of minimum monthly premium as prescribed by the state govt. The superannuated employees of the College are benefitted from the Rajasthan Pensioner's Medical Fund, besides being given gratuity and pension. Realizing that satisfied employee is an asset for the institution and can make the college a productive place, the administration has put several incentive measures in place for the teaching as well as non-teaching staff' besides the salary package. The Rajasthan Service rules read in concurrence with pay commission recommendation of UGC provides respectable and satisfactory salary and job inducements. Different types of leaves are admissible for teaching staff and non-teaching staff as per the Rajasthan Service Rules.

The performance of every employee, whether teaching or non-teaching, is appraised by the principal and reviewed by the competent authority on annual basis covering various aspects of working, behavior and overall performance. This helps in assessing the devotion and commitment towards institution and thus overall conduct of the employee. For teaching staff, this is now on online mode through SSO portal.

The achievements of faculty members are monitored and maintained through Performance based appraisal system (PBAS) as per the guidelines from UGC. The records are kept in the office of the Commissionerate to be reviewed by DPC at the time of promotions. The 'Reporting Officer' judges and rates the work carried out by the reportee under six criteria (i) Output of work (ii) Leadership qualities (iii) Analytical ability (iv) Management ability (v) Decision making ability (vi) Ability to take initiative. The 'Reviewing' authority, the Commissioner then finally gives the overall rating, which then is conveyed back to the reportee who is now the 'Accepting' officer.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization**6.4.1**

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC is consistently working on to magnify the quality culture in its all spheres of the college activities. Some of the initiatives implemented are Gender sensitization programmes and empowerment of women Student welfare activities (Community Book Bank, Books Distribution, Books from donations) Student mentoring activities planned and organized Organization of programs and events to promote awareness for health and hygiene. To filter out the negative impact of Covid-19 pandemic on physical and mental health of students and society, following two practices have been adopted and institutionalized.

1. Programs and events to promote awareness for health and hygiene: To prevent and minimize the severity of the pandemic, the college followed SOPs/ guidance actively and along with sanitization drive, the vaccination camps have been organized in its premises for multiple times. The message to the society and large was “Sooner we able to minimize the prevalence rate of Covid-19 better we secure our good health”. Social Outreach activities (through NSS and NCC) throughout the pandemic have been epitome

of the prompt action of the college.

2. Gender sensitization programmes and empowerment of women: College has been active organizer for women centric programmes and activities. The students have been passed through conditioning sessions for gender un-biasness and mutual respect.

The IQAC works towards realizing the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance. Suggestions made by IQAC have been executed at the levels of developing IT Infrastructure, effective teaching, proper allocation, and maintenance of funds. The following measures were taken during year 2020-21 to review the teaching-learning process, operational strategies and learning outcomes: 1. To keep unhindered academic activities during Covid-19 period, in tune with the decision of the Commissionerate College Education to provide ample opportunities and platforms to students at their doorsteps, the quality subjectwise econtent, video & assignments were prepared by most of the faculty members of and made also online through their individual Youtube channels. Their links were shared on the website of the College and also amongst the class-wise Whatsapp groups created by Mentors. The motivated effort to facilitate such additional e-content has proven as booster classes for slow learners. Envisioning an ideal student-centric learning environment is only made possible through continuous evaluation and feedback by IQAC. The multiple level feedbacks were taken from teachers, students and alumni in the form of a separate questionnaire to render their advice on all aspects related to the development of the college. Student Feedback to evaluate the lecturers on the basis of their knowledge base, communication skills and interest generated by the lecturer indicates their quality efforts. Feedback regarding curriculum is analyzed by IQAC and discussed with the faculty members and later on placed before the Board of Studies meeting in the affiliating university. Other facet of feedback was generated through Vikas Samiti, stakeholders, alumni, in the form of meetings, interactions etc. on academic and physical facilities, and the teaching-learning environment.

Awareness is spread towards communal, social and economical diversities in students.

Rights of all students, employees and people who come to the college are protected by College. For this college has prepared its code of conduct that is available on the college website (Lcc.ac.in). To ensure compliance of the code of conduct, college has formed discipline committee. Discipline committee members take rounds in college campus in vacant periods.
